

PURPOSE

BACKGROUND

DISCUSSION

Table 1 is a summary of the current mining licences in the West Coast, including the existing bond quanta for those licences. SENZ's mining licences are not included in Table 1 because the bonds on those licences have already been reviewed and revised. This leaves 61 current mining licences.

"On the face of it", there are a number of mining licences that have either no or nominal bonds that Act, respectively. licences have insufficient bonds.
